Dear friends and neighbors,

have a great time and the weather was picture perfect. Unfortunately, National Night Out in August did not enjoy such great conditions as it was a bit warm that evening. However, that did not prevent several neighborhoods from hosting events, and I want to acknowledge their efforts in making this a great event each year.

As we look ahead to the fall, you know by now that the construction of our new pool in Bluebird Park has been a challenge, due to several weather delays. However, I am proud to say that by the time you are reading this, the pool, along with the new playground and restroom in Bluebird Park should be complete. While we won't be able to enjoy a long pool season this year with the new pool, I hope that you will join us for the grand opening celebration as a part of the Fall Festival on October 11th. Are you interested in making new friends, hearing great speakers, going on exciting trips, playing Bingo or cards? If you are 55 plus, this is a great group for you to become involved in!



April 7, 2009 General Election

An election will be held on Tuesday, April 7, 2009, to elect a mayor and a council member from *each* of the three Districts. Any Ellisville resident wishing to become a candidate for the office of mayor or council member may do so by filing an application in writing with the City Clerk, or in her absence with the City Manager, at the Ellisville City Hall, #1 Weis Avenue, between the hours of 8:00 A.M. Tuesday, December 16, 2008, and 5:00 P.M. Tuesday, January 20, 2009, with the following *exceptions*: City Hall will be closed on Thursday, December 25, 2008 and Friday, December 26, 2008; closed Thursday, January 1, 2009; and closed Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Monday, January 19, 2009.

Applicants for the office of Mayor must be at least 25 years of age, and applicants for Council Member must be at least 21 years of age. Additionally, all applicants must: (1) be a qualified voter in accordance with State Statutes; (2) be a resident of the City of Ellisville for one year preceding the election; and (3) not owe any unpaid taxes to the City of Ellisville.

Polling places will be published in the *Suburban Journal* shortly before voting day and all registered voters should also receive postcard notification of your polling place from the St. Louis County Board of Election Commissioners. If you have not already registered to vote, you may do so at all motor vehicle registration offices, at most State offices, at the Ellisville City Hall, or by mail with the appropriate form. March 11, 2009, is the last day to register to vote in the April 2009 election.



Police Department Expands Emergency Management Communication Capability

The City of Ellisville Emergency Management program has expanded its communication capability following the issuance of FCC Amateur Ham Radio Licenses to Chief Tom Felgate (Ellisville Emergency Management Coordinator), Captain Frank Kenney, Lieutenant Wayne Moore and Lieutenant Josh Dawson after eight weeks of study. Chief Felgate stated that the availability of police amateur (ham) radio operators adds another layer of critical communication with the St. Louis County Emergency Operations Center and area ham operators, should the police radio system and/or telephone system become interrupted in the event of a serious emergency. Ellisville and Eureka police are the only police departments in the West County area to have police officers trained and licensed in ham radio with the respective police department emergency operations plan. With ham radio, connection can be made with a local repeater which in turn transmits the message to the St. Louis County EOC and visa versa. If the repeater is also out of service, portable antennas can be implemented very quickly allowing communication to be enabled. Chief Felgate stated that he is very excited to include this in the Ellisville Emergency Operations Plan as a second tier of communication.

Mar-El Court Water Quality Improvements

“St. Louis County First”

As you may know, Mar-El Court is currently under construction. Part of the reconstruction involves the placement of the first water quality instruments in St. Louis County involving land disturbance for more than one acre for a municipal street improvements project.

Traditionally, debris, oil and vegetation would wash into the sewer system during a rain event and proceed directly to the local stream. Alternatively, with the new water quality improvements being constructed on Mar-El, the proprietary systems collect the contaminants and clean water is discharged downstream. As the water quality systems are filled, the contaminants are vacuumed out of the storage areas and disposed of properly.

The proprietary systems are the first of their kind to be used for this purpose in St. Louis County. This is another example of how the City of Ellisville is trying to improve the environment.

You may also remember that the improvements at Bluebird Park include water quality basins within the parking lot area. Coming soon will be educational maps located on foot bridges that provide information regarding the bioretention basins, describing their purpose and how they were constructed.

Although the City of Ellisville acted on these projects expeditiously, the impetus for the improvements came from the Environmental Protection Agency. In 2003, the Missouri Department of Natural Resources

issued a Phase II Storm Water Permit and circulated a Storm Water Management Plan to co-permittees in St. Louis County, one of which being the City of Ellisville. The purpose of this permit is to safeguard persons, protect property, and prevent damage to the environment in Ellisville. It will also promote the public welfare by guiding, regulating, and controlling the design, construction, use, and maintenance of any development or other activity that disturbs or breaks the topsoil or results in the movement of earth or land in Ellisville.

Fall Brush Chipping Program

Brush Drop-Off / Mulch Pick-up Area to be Relocated

Beginning in October, residents who wish to participate in the program should place their brush and tree trimmings by the road prior to the scheduled pick-up date. The Public Works crew will spend two weeks in each district. Because of time constraints, they will not be able to return to a street after the brush pick-up is completed. Limbs should be cut in four to 12-foot lengths and can be no thicker than four inches in diameter. Trash, thorny material, bushes with stumps or trees with stumps, leaves and grass, wood with nails or wire in it, dirt or rocks will not be chipped or picked up. These items are dangerous and may cause damage to the grinding equipment used to make mulch, or may injure an employee.

On October 13, 2008, the brush drop off area will be relocated from Bluebird Park to the new Public Works Facility located at 553 Old State Road. When the brochures for the October brush collection are sent to residents this fall, a reminder regarding the new drop off location will be provided. Mulch will be available for pick-up at Bluebird Park until the reserve is completely diminished; then the mulch will be available for pick-up at the new Public Works Facility.

Trimmings (not entire trees) will continue to be accepted from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Sunday.

The brush chipping program is only for individual homeowners to discard their tree trimmings. This program is not for land clearing operations, removal of entire trees or commercial business use of any kind.

As you may know, the Public Works crew converts the brush into mulch using a tub grinder machine. This procedure is typically performed every Friday. During this time, the mulch pile is closed to the residents for safety purposes. To confirm that the mulch pile area is "closed" for tub grinding, residents can call the Public Works office at (636) 591-6666.

Christmas Tree Disposal

Christmas trees can be dropped off at the Public Works Facility in the area designated "mulch/brush drop-off area" beginning January 1 through January 31, 2009. If you are unable to drop off your tree, the Public Works Department will pick it up at your residence. Place your tree along the side of the road in front of your home prior to the beginning date for pickup in your district. Only one pass will be made through each district. The trees will be chipped and made into mulch material. The mulch will be available at the Public Works Facility in the area designated "mulch/brush drop-off area" for use by Ellisville residents.

As a reminder for future brush collection activity the city offers the following information;

1) Because of time constraints, brush chipping crews will not return to a street after the brush pick-up has been completed. Please have your brush out the weekend before your area is scheduled for pick up.

2) Limbs should be cut in 4 to 12 foot lengths and can be no thicker than 4 inches in diameter.

3) Trash, thorny material, bushes with stumps or trees with stumps, leaves and grass, wood with nails or wire in it, dirt or rocks will not be chipped or picked up. These items are dangerous and may cause damage to the grinding equipment used to make mulch, or may injure an employee.

2008 Fall Leaf Pickup Program

The Public Works crew will begin the 2008 Fall Leaf Collection during November. Residents who wish to take the opportunity and clear the leaves off their property may rake the leaves in rows to the gutter or ditch line (please keep leaves out of the curb line.) Please remove rocks, glass, branches or other hard materials. Such items are harmful to city equipment and may injure an employee during collection. Due to various sizes of piles, we cannot specify the exact time or date collection on a particular street will occur. Please have your leaves out the weekend before your area is scheduled for pick up. The Public Works Department will make two pickups. Check the schedule below for dates in your district. Please remember this service will be contingent upon weather conditions.
