The City of Ellisville will host its Annual Independence Day Celebration in Bluebird Park on Thursday, July 4th. Festivities begin bright and early with a new edition to the Celebration, the Ellisville Independence Day 5K Race beginning at 7:30 a.m. Come back to Bluebird Park at 6:00 p.m. and help us celebrate with the best fireworks in the St. Louis Metro Area. The evening begins with attractions including a climbing wall, euro bungy, and giant slide. There will also be great food, drink, music by Smash Band, and fireworks in the beautiful surroundings of Bluebird Park.

The Run/Walk will begin at 7:30 a.m. Check-in time is from 6:30 a.m. - 7:15 a.m. In addition, there is a FREE 1 Mile Kids' Dash immediately following the 5K Run/Walk. Following the 1 Mile Kids' Dash, an award ceremony will be held. Registration for the event is \$25.00 and \$30.00 on the day of the event. Mail-in registrations must be post-marked by Friday, June 28. In-person registration will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. on Monday, July 1, with on-line registrations being accepted until midnight. Shuttle bus services will run to and from Bluebird Park every 15 minutes, beginning at 5:30 p.m. and ending at 11:00 p.m. The two points of departure are: Cooper-Bussmann, located at 114 Old State Road, and FCC Corporation (formally known as Fru-Con), at the northwest corner of Clarkson/Clayton Roads.

The only parking permitted in Bluebird Park during the Celebration is reserved for vendors and persons with disabilities. If you are a vendor or a person with a disability and wish to park in Bluebird Park, please be aware that vehicular traffic will not be allowed to leave the Park until all foot traffic has been cleared.

The Independence Day Celebration will offer a fun-filled evening of fun, music, food, and a tremendous fireworks show. Everyone is welcome to attend! For questions or to request more information, please contact the Parks and Recreation Department at (636)227-7508.

Please note that limited seating will be available and no glass bottles or pets will be allowed in the Park during the Celebration.

Kids' Safety Day

The Ellisville Police Department will be sponsoring their 8th Annual Kids' Safety Day event later this year (TBA). Once the date has been determined, the event will be from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. on the west parking lot of St. John Church, 15800 Manchester Road in Ellisville. The event will feature free child carseat inspections/installations and bicycle helmet inspections.

Trained, certified carseat technicians will be available to check child passenger seats for proper installation. The technician will teach parents/caregivers how to properly install and choose a child seat that meets their child's needs. Each inspection will take approximately 20 minutes. "Drive-ups" on the day of the event are also welcomed.

In addition to carseat inspections, the Ellisville Police Department will inspect and properly fit your child's safety helmet. The purpose of the program is to help reduce the incidents of unintentional injury to children related to non-use or improper fitting of child safety helmets. A very limited number of free helmets will be available for residents. Parents are encouraged to bring their child's bicycle helmet to the event for a safety inspection and correct fitting.

Parents and their children will be able to visit several information/fun booths containing information related to child safety issues. Children and their parents will be able to meet and visit with members of the Police Department, fire district, and military staff members that are located in the area. Demonstrations by various organizations throughout the community are planned along with free games and prizes for children and parents.

Free raffle drawings will be conducted throughout the event. Also, free food and refreshments, kindly donated by various area businesses, will be given away.

Fourth of July Traffic Regulations

1. Traffic flow on Kiefer Creek Road will not be interrupted in either direction until approximately 9:30 p.m. at which time the northbound lane of Kiefer Creek Road at Pierside Lane will be closed to allow for the line-up of the shuttle buses to transport visitors to the various designated parking lots. NOTE: Anyone with a vehicle wishing to leave Bridge Creek Trails, Polo Lake or Wood Hill subdivisions will be allowed to leave their subdivisions but must detour south on Kiefer Creek Road to Pierside Lane. Police Officers will be directing traffic south at Kiefer Creek Road and onto Pierside Lane.

2. At approximately 9:50 p.m., the southbound lane of Kiefer Creek Road will be closed from Manchester Road to the Park to all traffic except emergency vehicles. Note: Any vehicle needing to leave Carmel Woods or Parkview Estates subdivisions will be allowed to go either direction until 9:30 p.m. and northbound only on Kiefer Creek Road until 9:50 p.m.

3. The roadways will be reopened as soon as the pedestrian traffic has cleared enough to make it reasonably safe; this should be around 11:00 p.m., but pedestrian safety will dictate the actual reopening time of the roadway.

4. Residents walking to and from Bluebird Park from Polo Lake and The Oaks subdivisions are asked to use the sidewalk on Kiefer Creek Road to Woodhill, then the paved trail connecting the park to Woodhill and avoid walking on Kiefer Creek Road to the Park. The trail is lighted and patrolled by police for your safety.

This trail will be closed to pedestrian traffic five minutes before the fireworks begin until until five minutes after the final discharge for safety reasons.

Bluebird Park – Amphitheater Hill Tree Planting

In the fall of 2012, six red maple trees were planted on the top slope of Amphitheater Hill in Bluebird Park. The trees will supply shade and relief from heat during the Concerts in the Park and other Park functions.

Red Maple trees bring color to the Park landscape year-round. Green stems turn red in winter; while new leaves are red-tinged and turn green. The fall color of the Red Maple is deep red or yellow. Flowers are also red. The Red Maple is fast growing and tolerant of many soils. The maple tree will grow to 40' to 60' high, with a spread of approximately 40'.

Strategically placed shade trees reduce temperatures up to ten degrees. This will be pleasant surprise for concert goers this summer.

***Special Memorial Day Ceremony
to Honor
Sergeant Zachary M. Fisher***

On Memorial Day, May 27, 2013, the City of Ellisville honored those military personnel that have made the ultimate sacrifice in service to our country. A ceremony was held at 10:00 a.m. at the Lafayette War Memorial located at Bluebird Park, 225 Kiefer Creek Road.

This year's memorial service not only honored all those that gave their lives, but also paid tribute to Sergeant Zachary M. Fisher, 24, of Ballwin, Missouri who was killed by an IED (Improvised Explosive Device) on July 14, 2010 in Zabul Province, Afghanistan. His name was inscribed on the Lafayette War Memorial granite monument under Operation Enduring Freedom.

According to the Missouri Military Memorial Foundation, Sergeant Fisher, assigned to the 618th Engineer Support Company (Airborne), 27th Engineer Battalion (Combat Airborne), 20th Engineer Brigade (Combat) Fort Bragg, North Carolina, was killed when insurgents attacked his military vehicle with a command wired improvised explosive device.

Sergeant Fisher was a 2004 graduate of Marquette High School in Chesterfield, MO, earning the President's Achievement Award his senior year. "Zack" met his wife, Jessica, while on a float trip in the summer of 2006, just prior to going active duty. He deployed to Iraq in February, 2007. After returning home for Christmas, he proposed to Jessica in December, and they were married April 26, 2008, at B'nai El Temple in Frontenac, MO. Zack is remembered by his numerous friends as the "best" friend, and he always had the ability to make them laugh. He always had a spot in his heart for history. Some of his favorite movies included "Braveheart," "The Patriot", and "Saving Private Ryan".

The deployment to Afghanistan in December, 2009 was Sergeant Fisher's second deployment, after a previous

deployment to Iraq from February, 2007 to November 2007. At a memorial service held at Fort Bragg, North Carolina on August 24, 2010, Sergeant Fisher was described as a "Section Sergeant responsible for nine junior Soldiers. He was the epitome of the Non-Commissioned Officer, always providing the right training, mentoring, and decisions for his Soldiers."

Sergeant Fisher's awards included the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart, Army Commendation, Army Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Afghanistan Campaign Medal with Campaign Star, the Iraqi Campaign Medal with Campaign Star, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Non-Commissioned Officer Professional Development Ribbon, the Army Service Ribbon, the Overseas Ribbons, the NATO Medal, Combat Action Badge, Parachutists Badge, and the Driver Qualification Badge.

Sergeant Fisher was laid to rest with full military honors at the Thomas Howell Cemetery, Weldon Springs, MO, on July 26, 2010. The City of Ellisville was privileged to honor Sergeant Fisher for his sacrifice and service to our country at the 2013 Memorial Day Ceremony.

Great Streets - Part 1:

It seems that many people have heard of “Great Streets,” but what is it? Great Streets started as an initiative by East West Gateway Council of Governments (EWG); it is a mechanism to foster coordinating between community planning and street engineering in the St. Louis Metro Area. As you may know, EWG is the “broker” of all federal money given to the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) for their programs (including installation and maintenance of streets and highways). The main principles behind the Great Streets Initiative are to encourage the design and implementation of streets that consider all modes of transportation and that enhance or bring value to the communities they serve. These ideas are not radical in nature, but they are a departure from MoDOT’s imperatives of previous decades. In other words, MoDOT has moved from a climate of where getting cars from point A to point B as quickly as possible was a top priority to a new imperative that values pedestrians, bicyclists, rapid transit and place-making (bringing community value) equally to moving cars.

The Great Streets Initiative challenges transportation engineering to be considerate of alternate modes of transportation, adjacent land uses and impacts to the community the roads serve. Roadway improvements are expensive to install and maintain. Not only is the cost significant, but the ramifications of such improvements will resonate for decades, as these improvements will help shape and influence the adjacent land uses and community for a long time after they are installed.

In 2007, EWG launched its Great Streets Initiative campaign, including a demonstration competition, where three projects would be selected as demonstration projects. The cities of Wildwood, Ellisville, Ballwin, Winchester and Manchester submitted an application for the Manchester Road Corridor to be selected as a demonstration project and were selected. In 2008, a

series of several workshops, charrettes and meetings were held to flesh-out the issues in the corridor, identify measures that could be taken to help increase safety for all users of the corridor, and boost economic vitality in the corridor. The culmination of this first round demonstration project was a summit forum where key representatives (business owners, property owners, residents, local agencies, municipalities, etc.) voted to implement an Intergovernmental Agreement and pursue a second demonstration project award to develop a master plan for the corridor. This first round was instrumental in informing the key players with influence or jurisdiction over the Manchester Road Corridor of the importance of building roads that consider all modes of transportation and enhance and bring value to the communities they serve.

In 2009, all five cities adopted an Intergovernmental Agreement to cooperate together and pursue the development of a master plan for the corridor that would guide public and private investment in the Manchester Road Corridor, while encouraging the Great Streets principles. Design Workshop was selected to develop the master plan and after many public meetings and workshops completed the Great Streets Master Plan in 2011. The master plan was adopted in 2011 by the cities of Wildwood, Ellisville and Ballwin. Although the cities of Winchester and Manchester have chosen not to adopt the Plan at this time, they are able to opt-in in the future.

The master plan is a comprehensive document and consists of several chapters; Project Background, Economic Analyses, Illustrative Master Plan, Transportation, Utilities, Parks and Open Space, Historic Preservation, Signage and Wayfinding, Storm Water, Lighting, Public Art, Landscape Plan, and Implementation. The Project Background chapter summarizes the process used to develop the master plan, while the Economic Analyses chapter identifies and summarizes the economic forces at play along the corridor and adjacent properties. Based on the analyses, we discovered

that the future population growth will occur in young professionals and empty-nesters. These two groups represent a smaller household type with preference to newer and higher density residential homes in locations with close proximity to shopping, recreation and jobs. Additionally, the analyses revealed that the Manchester Road corridor is over-zoned for retail; there is more property zoned for retail than can be currently supported. The analyses also indicated that under the current corridor conditions and format, retail demand will remain relatively flat over the next decade or two. Finally, the analyses revealed that there is a lack of new professional office space in the corridor.

Based on the economic analyses, the Illustrative Master Plan chapter recommends the concentration of retail to Town Centers. In Ellisville, a town center is proposed at the intersection of Clarkson and Manchester Roads, which would feature higher density commercial and office space as well as high density residential units. The plan recommends the conversion of properties in between town centers to office and high density residential, which would increase the population base and potential shoppers, without compromising our existing single family residential subdivisions.

Each of the following chapters makes specific recommendations to address the issues identified as part of the process. Increased safety, better traffic flow and improved aesthetics for the corridor were high priorities for participants of the process and have been diligently addressed in the master plan.

The three communities have a significant opportunity to create destinations and developments that are more
