Volunteers In Police Service

Ellisville Police Chief Steve Lewis launched a new program in July of 2018 called “Volunteers in Police Service” (VIPS). The Ellisville Police Department joined many other law enforcement agencies around the country who use volunteers to supplement public safety and crime prevention efforts. Several Citizens participated in the program for over a year before the Pandemic took away the opportunity to continue to serve in that capacity. We are now interested in bringing the program back!

Volunteers are an important part of any organization and have proven a valuable asset to law enforcement. The Ellisville Police Department utilizes volunteers for assistance with a variety of functions – most notably as police chaplains and police reserves. The VIPS program expanded opportunities for qualified volunteers to assist the department in a wide range of roles and functions including speeding enforcement, community programs, elderly care facility patrol and a number of other important roles. The program gives individuals the opportunity to give back to their community in a meaningful way and to support their local law enforcement agency whose members often wear “several hats” in their everyday work load. Our volunteers are a force multiplier and reach out to the community to give insight to the public on the police officers who work in their community, says Chief Lewis.

The Ellisville Police Department VIPS program is seeking eight to ten initial volunteers. The majority of past volunteers were retired citizens of the community and had been active in other volunteer adventures. Whether it is as simple as help entering data, or as involved as conducting a radar survey, the VIPS is able to assist the department in carrying out tasks, jobs, and public services that might not be in existence if it were not for the help of the VIPS. 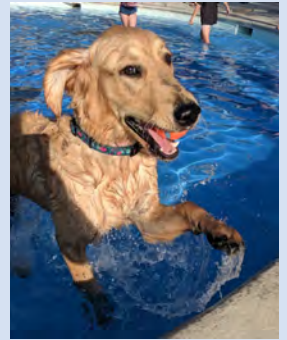
Pooch Plunges

Managed Deer Hunt in Klamberg Conservation Area

The Missouri Department of Conservation and the City of Ellisville are working cooperatively to administer a managed deer hunt to help control the deer population. During the hunt the conservation area will be closed to the public but the majority of Bluebird Park will remain open. The dates for this year's hunt are Monday - Friday, November 7-11, 2022.

Five hunters will be selected through the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) managed hunt system. All hunters will attend a pre-hunt meeting. All are required to use archery or crossbow equipment, hunt from an elevated stand and are required to harvest an antlerless deer before a second deer (antlered or antlerless) can be taken. A maximum of three deer can be harvested per hunter. No shooting zones of 25 yards are established along the boundaries of Klamberg Conservation Area.

Rainscaping Grant Opportunities

Rainscaping reclaims stormwater naturally using simple techniques to manage and filter rainwater where it falls – the way nature intended. This can be done through any combination of plantings, water features, catch basins, and permeable pavement, among other activities.

Stormwater runoff is created by hard surfaces that cannot absorb water, like concrete, the footprint of a house, and compacted soils. Every time it rains, stormwater flows down roofs, driveways, and other impervious surfaces, sometimes flooding basements or collecting in low spots. Other runoff continues toward the street, picking up soil, pesticides, oils, and other contaminants before it enters the sewer system that transports it to streams and lakes, often without treatment.

By lowering the amount of stormwater runoff entering the sewer system, rainscaping specifically helps to alleviate basement backups and sewer overflows, which can sometimes occur during periods of heavy rain. It also addresses water quality in the Mississippi River when overflows do occur.

Rainscaping is part of MSD Project Clear, a program by the Metropolitan St. Louis Sewer District (MSD) as part of an agreement with the Environmental Protection Agency and Missouri Coalition for the Environment to improve water quality in our community.



What are the benefits?

Reduce Water Problems – A rain garden gives water runoff a beneficial and safe place to go, helping to keep it away from your foundation where water problems can occur. It can also help reduce or eliminate water ponding on your property. Since rain gardens reduce

the amount of stormwater entering the sewer system, they can help prevent basement backups and sewer overflows.

Lower Maintenance – A rain garden essentially “waters itself,” requiring little or no additional irrigation once plantings are established. In fact, rain gardens are more likely than other gardens to survive droughts. Periodic weeding, mulching, and pruning are all the maintenance they need. Because you don’t need to fertilize or spray them, they make your yard a healthier place for your children and pets as well. Native plants are more tolerant of the climate, soil, and water conditions in our region, which is why they are recommended for rain gardens, and also easier to care for.

Beautify Your Property – Rain gardens can provide interesting planting opportunities, and are an attractive and creative alternative to traditional lawn landscapes.

Support Biodiversity – Not only are rain gardens pleasing to look at, they are an ideal habitat for birds, butterflies, pollinators, and other wildlife. Have fun spotting the colorful species that call your rain garden “home.”

Reduce Mosquitoes – In a properly designed rain garden, water will soak into the ground within a day or two, long before mosquitoes have the opportunity to breed. They can be designed to attract the kinds of insects and wildlife that feed off mosquitoes, reducing their numbers around your property. Rain gardens can also help eliminate yard ponding, in which water can pool long enough for mosquitoes to multiply.

Improve Water Quality for Everyone – Your rain garden is a solution to stormwater pollution. Polluted stormwater that enters waterways untreated can hurt both water quality and the wildlife that inhabit them. Because rainscaping reclaims stormwater where it falls, runoff is naturally filtered from contaminants and chemicals that might otherwise reach our creeks and streams. By limiting the amount of stormwater entering the sewer system, rain gardens help reduce combined sewer overflows. Excessive runoff can also erode banks and increase downstream flooding as well.

Half Cent Sales Tax Storm Water Improvement Project Update

In 2022, the City of Ellisville completed asphalt street resurfacing projects on Marsh Avenue from Clarkson Road to Hutchinson Road, on East Meadow Lane from Manchester Road to Tulip Lane and on West Meadow Lane. Each of these streets were resurfaced with new asphalt and isolated sections of deteriorated curb and gutter were replaced with new concrete curb and gutter.

There were also several concrete streets that were completely removed and replaced during 2022. The remaining streets in the Oaks at Ridge Meadow Subdivision were completed this summer. Approximately half of the streets in this subdivision were rebuilt in 2021. The remaining streets completed this year included Springbirch Court, Summer Oak Court, Summer Oak Circle, Summer Oak Drive and the west section of Autumn Bluff Drive. Additional concrete street replacement was completed on a section of East Meadow Lane from Carole Lane to Tulip Lane and a section of Autumn Oaks Drive from Pierside Lane to Autumn Oaks Circle.

These projects were all completed under the half cent sales storm water improvement tax. The City of Ellisville would like to thank all of the residents impacted by the projects for their patience and cooperation during these improvements. CITY OF ELLISVILLE FILING PROCEDURES APRIL 4, 2023 - GENERAL ELECTION

An election will be held on Tuesday, April 4, 2023, to elect three Council Members, one (1) from each of the three Council Districts. Any Ellisville resident wishing to become a CANDIDATE FOR COUNCIL MEMBER may do so by filing an application in writing with the City Clerk, or in her absence with the City Manager, at the Ellisville City Hall, #1 Weis Avenue, between the hours of 8:00am on Tuesday, December 6, 2022, and 5:00pm on Tuesday, December 27, 2022, with the following exceptions: City Hall will be closed on Friday, December 23, 2022 and Monday, December 26, 2022 to observe the holiday.

Applicants for the office of Council Member must be at least 21 years of age. Additionally, all applicants must: (1) be a qualified voter in accordance with State Statutes; (2) be a resident of the City of Ellisville for one year preceding the election; and (3) not owe any unpaid taxes to the City of Ellisville.

As part of the City's on-going efforts to help our businesses thrive, we are offering you the opportunity to introduce your business to every new resident by including a coupon or voucher in our New Resident Welcome Packets.

How the Program Works:

The City issues approximately forty (40) residential occupancy permits per month. That's forty new households (and potential customers) every month! We ask that you provide the City with enough coupons/vouchers to insert in each Welcome Packet. You decide whether to deliver new coupons monthly, quarterly or bi-annually. There is no fee for the service. Your only expense will be the production of the actual coupons/vouchers. Once you deliver the coupons/vouchers to City Hall, we will take care of the rest.

Coupons/vouchers must offer something free. In addition to offering a 'freebie', we encourage you to add language in your coupon/voucher 'welcoming' the new residents to Ellisville and your business. **Coupon/voucher may be sized up to 5" by 8" maximum.**

Coupons should be delivered to City Hall, 1 Weis Avenue, Ellisville, MO 63011 between 8am and 5pm. Mon. - Fri. Attention: Economic Development. Make sure all your business contact information is included.

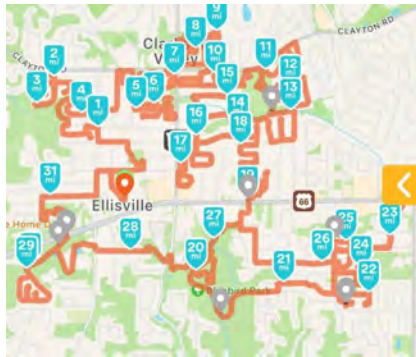

Ellisville Police Officers Pedal Into The Future

Nationwide, fuel budgets are bursting at the seams and everyone is looking for ways to cut fuel costs. How can we cut fuel costs and provide the same level of service to our residents? How can we cut fuel costs and improve our service to our residents? That's what Chief Steve Lewis wanted to know and thanks to a generous donation from the Ellisville Police Foundation, that's exactly what we did. We were able to provide the Ellisville Police Department with a fleet of e-bikes.

Ellisville has ten parks and over seven kilometers of walking trails which are not accessible by conventional patrol vehicles. E-bikes allow the Ellisville Police



to routinely patrol these areas and with a top speed of 20 miles per hour, rapidly respond to any calls for service within the City. But getting to a call isn't enough. Officers must be able to respond to a call and still have the stamina for a physical confrontation if needed. E-bikes significantly boost the power exerted by the officer to quickly cover territory and climb hills when needed without exerting all of the officer's energy. When officers are out on bike patrol, the e-bikes provide the officers with a more consistent pace and cardiovascular workout. Phone applications like Runkeeper and Strava allow the officers to track their e-bike patrols.



E-bikes also allow officers to quietly patrol large parking lots, looking for criminals that may be attempting smash and grab thefts or cutting catalytic converters off vehicles. E-bikes are also a great

public relations tool. Residents can quickly flag down a bike patrol officer and express their concerns about their neighborhood and ask questions. We've even had several residents offer officers a cold bottle of water when the heat index went insane. Bike patrol officers teach bicycle safety in our schools and at numerous summer camps throughout the City.

This is a win-win for the taxpayer and the Police Department. E-bikes help keep officers in good physical condition and reduce the amount of fuel and engine hours used by the vehicle fleet. This could potentially save the City thousands of dollars in fuel and maintenance costs and ultimately extend the life of the patrol vehicle fleet.
